Changes to Fallout Dust Sampling Requirements Currently: comments. In future: changes to sampling methods National Environmental Management: Air Quality Act (39 of 2004)

Background: The National Dust Control Regulations, 2013 were published in 2013 under GN R827. There has been confusion over the reference to ASTM D1739 - 70 as this was repealed by the issuing authority and replaced with ASTM D1739 - 98 (reapproved in 2004). As a result of this there have been varying sampling practices across the country.

The Minister of Environmental Affairs has submitted a revised draft of these regulations for comment. These were published under GN 517 Draft National Dust Control Regulations, in Government Gazette 41650 on the 25th May 2018. Comment must be submitted by the **25th of June 2018**.

Summary of requirement:

Any person conducting a mining operation, any listed activity that requires a fugitive dust emission management plan or any person required by an air quality officer, through a written notice, must implement a dustfall monitoring programme as required in terms of these regulations.

The following key changes are described:

- Sampling must be conducted according to the latest version of ASTM D1739. i.e. ASTM D1739 98 not ASTM D1739 70.
- Other internationally approved standards are not listed as accepted, as they had been previously
- Exceedances that are of a naturally occurring, non-anthropogenic source and extreme weather or geological event will be exempted
- Any person conducting a mining operation, or any listed activity that requires a fugitive dust emission management plan, must implement a dustfall monitoring programme.
 - Any person who has, up to now, not conducted a dustfall monitoring programme and who is now required to, must submit a first dustfall monitoring report in the form required by these regulations within three months of the implementation of these regulations.





- Monthly dustfall monitoring reports must be submitted to the Air Quality Officer and must meet the requirements of Regulation 13. These include but are not limited to the inclusion of:
 - Information on sensitive receptors
 - Proof that standard test methods were used
 - Meteorological data including at least hourly values for wind speed and wind direction
- Any person conducting a mining operation or any listed activity that requires a fugitive dust emission management plan, prior to undertaking such an activity, must implement a dust management plan as described in Regulation 16.
- These regulations will come into effect on the 1st of November 2019 unless otherwise stipulated.

Our opinions:

- These draft changes will result in an improved clarity of the requirements with regard to the standard test method that is used.
- There is still a problem for the industry regarding the size of the buckets (i.e. a minimum diameter of 15mm and a minimum height of twice the diameter). This must be clarified.
- The requirement for the measurement of meteorological information will require weather stations for each facility. This will have a cost impact.

Recommendation:

- Submit comments to the Minister within 30 days of the publication of these draft regulations (i.e. the 25th of June 2018). These may be submitted:
